1:15 pm Readiness for Change and Capacity for Innovation

We think a lot about maximizing opportunities for our early childhood systems efforts. How can we ensure that vision is driving action, that our strategies aren't static, and that we and our strategies remain responsive, adaptive, and opportunistic? What is needed for state systems leaders to be ready for change? When great opportunities arise, are you "in the right place at the right time with the right capacity" to move systems building forward? And how are readiness for change and innovation connected? Are they the same? What is the tension between your vision, concepts and values you hold dear, and daily practicalities? How are you part of protecting elements of the status quo that aren't working, perhaps inadvertently? How can you become able to make the changes necessary to achieve your vision? How much of being ready for change is about power and changing the power dynamics in your state - from the role of families to the power of professionals to the role of institutionalized racism?

This session will kick off with two presentations followed by large group discussion. It will include small group conversation about a variety of tools and exploration of the diversity of approaches to help you communicate and live out your vision.

8:30 am Developing Substantive Cross-Sector Partnerships with all the Agencies Serving Young Children and their Families

The children and families who most need support often enter through multiple doors, signifying increased risk factors in the family. Research shows only about 30% of children under the age of five are in a formal child care setting. The remaining 70% of children and their families may receive support from child welfare or immigrant services or housing or from a local church or the health system. How are we assuring coordination and integration so that families and their young children will receive support for what might be multiple needed, regardless of where they enter the system? How do we assure shared goals and policies across these very diverse programs and better link programs and resources? This will be a "fish bowl discussion" led by representatives of the diverse "doors" that families may approach.

10:30 am Breakout Session: The State of Early Learning and Development Standards for Dual Language Learners: Where We Are, Where We Need To Go

A new BUILD analysis of state's Early Learning and Development Standards (ELDS) demonstrates that states are shifting their approach to articulating expectations for dual language learners (DLLs) in response to their unique needs. States ELDS are evolving to include clear guidance on the need to support home language development and specific expectations for English language development for DLLs. In this session, participants will learn about states' progress incorporating comprehensive, research-based approaches to DLLs. Participants will discuss next steps for states as they improve standards, regulations, curriculum guidance, assessment practices, and professional development to support high quality programs for DLLs.
