Children as Bellwethers of Recovery

"Children and youth are particularly vulnerable to the effects of disasters. They have limited capacity to independently mobilize resources to help them adapt to stressful postdisaster circumstances, and are instead dependent upon others to make choices that will influence their household, neighborhood, school, and larger social environment.

Children's mental health recovery in a postdisaster setting can serve as a bellwether indicator of successful recovery or as a lagging indicator of system dysfunction and failed recovery." - Abramson DM1, Park YS, Stehling-Ariza T, Redlener I.





IMPACT: KATRINA

Children displaced by Katrina were 4.5 times more likely to have symptoms consistent with serious emotional disturbance

34% of middle or high-school children were one or more years older than appropriate for their grade (compared to 19% of all children in south)

60% of children displaced by Katrina to congregate settings either have serious emotional disorders, behavioral issues and/or are experiencing significant housing instability

50% of households who had been displaced for at least one year were still living in unstable conditions after four and a half years

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IMPACT: JOPLIN

19% in child abuse/sexual trauma

40% increase in domestic violence

80% increase in substance abuse

30% increase in suicides

Decreased test scores grades 3-12

52% increase in crisis calls




Preparedness Action Alert

Nearly 2 million people are under evacuation orders in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina.

This storm is dangerous. Category 4 winds of 145 mph are expected at landfall. Up to 15 inches of rain can be expected along with a storm surge of up to 8 feet along the coast.







Child Care Centers in the FEMA Floodplain & Supply and Demand Gap Kansas City, Kansas & Kansas City, Missouri






Recovery and Resiliency



Prompt restoration of child care services allows first responders to return to work more quickly, without delaying to find a new source for child care.


This further provides a benefit to children, as they can return to a normal schedule and become reunited with their peers, thus restoring stability and familiarity.



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Children at Risk in U.S.

Disasters Are Happening

- More disasters and more types of natural disasters happen in the U.S. each year than any other nation (UNDRR).
- Research shows that climate change is **increasing disaster risk** impacting the intensity and frequency of natural hazards (FEMA, Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change).

Families Aren't Ready


- 67% of parents say they are at least somewhat worried that that their child will be affected by a disaster (Save the Children).
- 65% of American families don't have adequate emergency plans and 41% of parents report not knowing where their child's school would be evacuated to (National Center for Disaster Preparedness, Columbia University).

As a Nation We're Underprepared to Protect Children

- 79% of recommendations made by the National Commission on Children and Disasters remain unfulfilled 10 years after Katrina (Save the Children).
- Following Hurricane Katrina, there were **5,000 reports** of missing children and it took **7 months** to reunite the last child with her family (National Commission on Children and Disasters).


