- Child care subsidy policy

- Include licenseexempt and relative care providers
- Offer resources in languages other than English



Outreach to the Full Range of Providers

- Provide access to information online and outside typical business hours
- Provide support and resources for those caring for children with special needs
- Connect to trusted sources within community
