



ILLINOIS EARLY LEARNING ACCESS PROJECT (IL ELAP)















Goal is to increase participation early care and education (ECE) programs among children in traditional or kinship foster care and whose families receive intact family services



Enhancing coordination & communication among CW workers ECE providers, & caregivers




Building infrastructure capacity






Advancing access across groups



PROJECT COMPONENTS

- Key informant interviews and policy & practice scan
- Human centered design (HCD) process involving caregivers, ECE providers, and CW caseworkers in Chicago and East St. Louis
- Testing of "solutions" that emerged from HCD process in Chicago and East St. Louis
- Elicitation of feedback on the solutions in other communities



FINDINGS FROM POLICY & PRACTICE SCAN

- 3 state agencies administer ECE programs
 - State Board of Education (Preschool for All & Early Childhood Special Education)
 - Department of Human Services (Childcare Assistance Program & Head Start Collaboration Office)
 - Department of Children & Family Services (childcare licensing)
- Rules & procedures to facilitate ECE enrollment of CW-system involved children vary by type of involvement & often misaligned with CCAP
- Data collection and reporting are inadequate
- Cross-system support is lacking
- New **Department of Early Childhood** will consolidate most programs in FY27

FINDINGS FROM KEY INFORMANT INTERVIEWS

- Enrolling children involved with the CW system in ECE programs can be difficult
 due to complex eligibility criteria and funding mechanisms as well as a lack of
 knowledge of policies and procedures among ECE providers and CW caseworkers
- Access to ECE programs is adversely affected by the limited availability, documentation requirements, and caregiver attitudes towards and experiences with ECE providers
- Consistent cross-system collaboration is lacking at both provider and system levels.

HUMAN CENTERED DESIGN PROCESS

- Identified problems/pain points
 - Complex eligibility and funding rules are unclear to caregivers, ECE providers and CW workers
 - Distrust of systems/fear of being reported to CPS prevents caregivers from enrolling children in ECE programs
 - Lack of transportation limits access to ECE programs
- 2 of the 4 potential solutions will be tested in Chicago and East St. Louis
 - Increasing visibility and connection with DCFS School Readiness Teams
 - Helping families more easily identify local ECE programs for which they are eligible
- Currently working with DCFS to determine what will be feasible.

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KAN-LINK VISION, AIM, AND FOCUS

VISION

Ensure Kansas families can connect to the services they need to thrive safely in their communities.

AIM


Increase access to early childhood ecosystem supports for all Kansas families to reduce the need for child welfare system intervention.

FOCUS

Family-led policy scan and pilot design to:

- Identify and introduce opportunities to support family linkage to early childhood ecosystem.
- Test small practice changes in local contexts.

Family Resource Center (FRC) pilots for small tests of local practice change for connecting families to ECE services:

Health Insurance Navigation Screening

Perinatal Care Linkage K-12 Enrollment ECE Screening

WIC ECE Screening

Test, iterate, scale



EMERGENT FINDINGS

Process

• Sequencing activities with lived experts ensure family perspective is centered in interpretation, actions, and recommendations

Policy

- Formal processes connecting families to ECE in state and organizational policy are largely absent
- Technical and adaptive support are required for translating policy to practice
- DCF policy recommendation example: Resource sharing with individuals making reports of concern

Practice

 Small adjustments in workflows that support cross-system connections are easily adopted and sustained (i.e., hotline training, resource letter, addition of checkbox)

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Child Welfare Early Learning Navigator (CWELN) Program





23,500 families with children under five become involved with CPS, fewer than half of these children were engaged in early learning services


Caseworkers' primary role is ensuring the physical safety of children, early learning services are not the focus during an assessment.

Who are the Navigators?

 They have expertise in both the child welfare and early learning systems – address this service referral gap by working alongside families and caseworkers to ensure interested families successfully start in services.

 They proactively identify and reach out to eligible families, assess early learning needs, and then match them with a service in their community.

A Day in the Life of a Navigator







Prioritizing Child Safety & Well-being through Policy

CPS Investigations/FAR:

- The assigned caseworker must complete a referral to Early Support for Infants and Toddlers (ESIT) within two business days of identifying a child younger than three years old with a possible developmental delay.
- Refer children to preschool, licensed childcare or home visiting services.

• CFWS:

- Child Health and Education Tracking (CHET) will complete assessment for out of home placement and case worker is to follow recommendations and complete referrals.
- Utilize protective language as a condition for return home.

How we support case management with an Early Learning Lens

Prevention

- Voluntary for parents and caregivers
- Respect the parents' choices
- Connection to services
- Provide protective factors for families
- Harm reduction

Life of a case

- Supports active efforts
- CWELNS can help after case closure
- Support family wellbeing throughout the case
- Create natural supports and healthy communities
- Prevention services and additional safety plan participants



Implementation Strategies in each Region



Tribal: Works on relationships with federally recognized tribes and early learning services to ensure families are receiving culturally appropriate services. Positioned in Office of Tribal Relations



Region 1: Provides field focused work, primarily in preventative services (CPS/FAR/In home) to Spokane County. Positioned on Regional Programs Team.



Region 2*: Provides support for all case workers and children in out of home placement. Positioned on Regional Programs

Team. *2nd CWELN initially hired, funding through DCYF



Region 3: Working closely with the SEAS Program of Whatcom County, a newly developed referral system




Region 4*: Provides case consultations through mandatory case staffing's. Positioned in Partnership, Prevention and Services Unit within Head Quarters.



Region 5: Provides support for preventative services. Positioned in Partnership, Prevention and Services Unit within Head Quarters.



Region 6*: Provides field focused work, primarily with preventative services (CPS/FAR/In home) to 7 of the 11 counties. Positioned with Regional Programs Team.



Our Success Strategies

- Relationships with case workers and providing guides
- Connections with community partners and involvement in local early learning coalitions
- Expertise in Early Learning and Child Welfare
- Client engagement as a neutral party
- Implementing trainings with community agencies and case workers
- Consultations on difficult cases




Our Impact

The CWELN team has assessed and connected with over 5,000 child welfare involved families 2024.

- Childcare 12 months of free childcare through working connections
- ECEAP / Head Start / Early Head Start
- ESIT / Child Find
- Home visiting

CY2022-2024: Eligible Children Served by the Child Welfare Early Learning Navigators (CWELN)



Note: Eligible children are any child aged 0-5 with an active child welfare intake. Served children represent families contacted by a navigator. Although this graph represents statewide eligibility, navigators only provide support in assigned child welfare offices.

What is next?

- Collect and analyze data that informs next locations for <u>NEW</u> navigator positions throughout Washington State
- Gain access to more early learning systems to streamline enrollment and reduce barriers (Immunization records, childcare licensing information, etc.)
- Continuing to highlight navigator value and support further implementation across systems
