




Language Interpretation

Cabinet members will work with community organizations to host feedback sessions to listen, share information and gather feedback on state policy.



Inform

and priorities.

address questions,

Successful family engagement and leadership requires

- an intentional focus on building trusting collaborative relationships over time;
- recognizing, respecting, and understanding families' needs and unique experiences as well as historical, cultural and linguistic assets; and
- embracing a philosophy of partnership where power and responsibility are shared or ceded.



It also requires..

- Removing barriers to participation
- Including diverse family perspectives
- Providing appropriate stipends and compensation
- Engaging in professional development
- Providing coaching and ongoing support to parents
- Creating regular feedback loops







Engagement Continuum

Transactional

- One-way communication that aims to inform families
- Examples: Participating in surveys, workshops, trainings, and events

Transitional


- Two-way communication that aims to consult and involve families
- Examples: Providing feedback on survey development and analysis, co-develop or facilitate trainings and events, participate in community advisory committees

Transformational

- Two-way communication and co-design that aims to shift power to families
- Examples: Families co-develop and facilitate trainings, codesign policy and implementation, shared decision-making










- Held community conversations with county executives, city officials, philanthropic partners, and stakeholders
- Identified barriers and solutions in accessing child care options (e.g., lack of public transportation after 5pm)
- Co-designed the City of Beloit's Child Care Action Plan that is currently being implemented
- Successfully advocated for additional \$1.5M from the county for child care providers and parents

- Provide input throughout decisionmaking process;
- Drive policy, program, and funding decisions;
- Determine implementation strategies; and
- Ensure decisions and implementation meet the needs of community.
